INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE AND STRATEGY

The Fund is a Peso-denominated balanced Unit Investment Trust Fund that aims to achieve for its participants growth and high income from a portfolio of diversified blue-chip and fundamentally sound equities listed at the Philippine Stock Exchange (PSE) and peso-denominated fixed income securities. The Fund may invest between 40% and 60% of its market value in equities listed in Philippine Stock Exchange and a minimum of 40% of its market value in peso-denominated fixed income securities. The Fund's blended benchmark is composed of 60% Philippine Stock Exchange Index and 40% Markit iBoxx ALBI Philippines 1-5 Index.

CLIENT SUITABILITY

A client profiling process is performed prior to participating in the Fund to guide the prospective investor if the Fund is suited to his/her investment objectives and risk tolerance. Clients are encouraged to update the resulting profile every three (3) years or if there's any change in his/her personal/financial circumstances. Before deciding to invest, clients are advised to read the Declaration of Trust/Plan Rules of the Fund, which may be obtained from the Trustee, or seek an independent/professional opinion when necessary.

The METRO BALANCED FUND is suitable only for investors who:

- Have an Aggressive profile.
- Want capital growth over the long-term and are willing to be exposed to a higher level of risk that may involve possible loss of principal in the short-term in exchange for higher long-term gains.
- Recommended investment horizon is at least five (5) years
- Participation in the Fund shall be open to Filipino individuals, resident and non-resident aliens and corporate accounts.

Interest Rate Risk:

Liquidity Risk:



OUTLOOK AND STRATEGY

In March, the PSEI took a breather from its four-month rally, ending the month with a slight decline of -0.6% m/m, closing at 6,903.53. Investor sentiment was somewhat muted, as concerns about inflation resurfaced, along with speculations that interest rates might remain higher for longer than anticipated. Additionally, foreign investors reverted back to selling. Inflation worries were fueled by the latest local print for February, which showed a rise to 3.4% from 2.8% in January, driven by elevated rice prices due to global supply disruptions. Meanwhile, in the US, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell emphasized the central bank's focus on monitoring inflation risks, indicating a cautious approach to policy adjustments. Despite the cautious sentiment, trading activity saw a slight uptick, with average daily volume reaching about \$124 million, partly boosted by rebalancing flows from FTSE. However, foreign investors ended the month as net sellers, halting their four-month inflow streak. Overall, market participants grappled with finding strong catalysts to propel the index past the 7,000 mark amidst prevailing uncertainties.

In terms of notable market movements, foreign investors showed renewed buying in banking stocks as interest rates remained elevated. Both BDO and MBT hit 1-year highs, with MBT slightly favored due to its announcement of a higher dividend payout, reaching approximately 8% yield. Conversely, the properties sector experienced an outflow as sentiment turned sour amidst expectations of prolonged elevated interest rates. FTSE flows wielded considerable influence on market dynamics, which brought net foreign selling to end the month in the amount of \$45 million. Noteworthy shifts in investment included the removal of EMI (-\$49 million), AGI (-\$30 million), SECB (-\$21 million), and MWC (-\$14 million) from the index, which notably contributed to the selling pressure. Conversely, BPI (+\$11.5 million) received an upweight from the index, which helped offset some of the selling pressure.

In corporate news, BLOOM garnered attention following Enrique Razon Jr.'s settlement with Global Gaming Philippines (GGAM), acquiring 921 million BLOOM shares for USD 300 million. Initially causing a selloff in BLOOM's stock price, the announcement led to a -8.7% d/d decline, but the stock quickly rebounded, ending the month down only -1.6%. In terms of earnings, approximately 80% of index companies have disclosed their FY2023 financial results. These reports indicate an overall growth of +28% y/y, with a particularly robust performance of +58% y/y for the fourth quarter of 2023. Among the companies that have reported, 50% met the market's expectations, while 42% fell short, and a mere 8% surpassed expectations.

For the month, we saw yields move sideways with a downward bias, just lower by an average of 3bps MoM. Both the 20y and 25y BVAL were lower by about 5bps MoM. The 20y and 25y BVAL is now at 6.26% vs previous month's BVAL of 6.31%. The BTr already released its 2Q2024 borrowing program, where they plan to issue a total of PhP195Bn in T-Bills and PhP390Bn in T-Bonds, for a total of PhP585Bn for the quarter. For the T-Bonds, the BTr will be issuing securities with tenors 7y, 10y, 15y and 20y in April, May and June. There is just an additional 3y auction in May.

Overall, our priority remains identifying companies with market leadership and exposure to resilient consumption segments, strong cash flow generation, and earnings visibility. Given the fragile yet improving macroeconomic conditions, we favor investing in liquid, high-quality companies. We anticipate corporate earnings to grow by 6% in 2024, factoring in a 13x PE for FY2024, setting our FY2024 PSEI target at 7,400. For the FI portion, we also kept our strategy of maintaining overweight duration versus its benchmark, and keeping cash to a minimum.
